Proven Results

Follow-up research shows that participation enhances prospects for students from all walks of life.

Young Enterprise NI measure impact pre and post participation to gauge longer-term advantages, with the focus on skills development and each participant's journey. Over 2/3 of students increase their interest in business start-up as a career path. 75% increase awareness of the employability skills required. Over 85% of participants demonstrate improved skills across more than five areas.

The results prove that investment in skills for all young people has a long-term impact. It's too late to develop competence in skills once in work. It needs to run in parallel with education.



Enterprise For All



Young Enterprise is now offering their company programme experience at all stages of learning: Primary, Post Primary/Secondary and University/Tertiary - truly in the spirit of our #EnterpriseForAll agenda.

Business Beginnings has seen rapid growth, allowing over 3,500 P7 students to run a student business this year.

Our Access Enterprise programme, supported by Choice Housing, was launched this year to introduce young people from local community groups to the world of business, giving them an insight into the world of work, whilst enhancing their softer skills in team work, communication, presentation skills, confidence, and problem solving. The programme, which is

accredited with an OCN level one in Vocational Skills, will give the young people the opportunity to work with local businesses and business advisors ensuring they get real hands on experience.

In October 2018 Young Enterprise initiated a Start Up programme in partnership with **Ulster University Students Union**, taking its successful student company model to a new level. Teams of students from each campus set up a business, buy shares, trade for five months and compete at the UK Final. The Young Enterprise initiative complements the **UUSU Enterprise Centre**, which supports students and graduates to develop and achieve their ambitions.

'Parents Attitudes to Enterprise Education' Survey

Young Enterprise aims to embed enterprise education in all aspects of curriculum delivery, starting at the earliest stage. Parents agree.

In our recent survey on 'parents' attitudes to enterprise education' with **Parenting NI** and **NI4Kids**, over 97% of survey respondents thought it important to build enterprise education into the curriculum to develop entrepreneurial and career skills for a healthy economy. 92% believe preparation for the world of work should begin at primary school.


As one parent said, 'By the time my child leaves school, the workplace will be totally different'. Parents felt the main challenges for children included: lack of skills, the need to develop resilience and adaptability, rapid technological changes and uncertainty, managing the transition from education to work.

Over 95% agreed running enterprises with other students was valuable for developing abilities for work and career choices. Or, in the words of a parent, 'It's not all about academic achievement'; but rather building confidence, relationships with others, teamwork and leadership.







Do you think Primary school children should learn about skills and future of work?

Over 10 million young people aged 5–25 in more than 100 countries now take part, mentored by more than 450,000 volunteers. JA is now considered the global expert on youth enterprise education; an invaluable resource for Young Enterprise NI.

Successful Change Takes Skill

'Five years from now over one-third of skills (35%) that are considered important in today's workforce will have changed.' This was one of the key findings of the World Economic Forum report The Future of Jobs, published in 2015. It's autumn 2019, and the transformation is obvious.

By 2020, the report continued, the Fourth Industrial Revolution will usher in advanced robotics and self-driving vehicles, artificial intelligence and machine learning, new materials, biotechnology and genomics.

These developments are here, already transforming how we live and work, but more importantly, how next generations will live and work. By the time our children leave school, many jobs will vanish, others will grow, and careers that don't exist today will be commonplace. What is certain, the report concluded, is that the future workforce will need to align its skillset to keep pace.

Young Enterprise is ahead of the game. The Top Ten essential skills are all gained through participation in Young Enterprise entrepreneurship education, delivered in partnership with schools and colleges at all levels. Further, their practice of bringing together decisionmakers, leaders and government follows the Forum's words of advice.

The Top Ten Skills

The Forum asked chief human resources and strategy officers from leading global employers what the changes mean for employment, skills and recruitment. Their top ten skills for 2020 reflect capabilities, critical for all, that no computer, robot or algorithm can accomplish.

- 1. Complex problem solving
- 2. Critical thinking
- 3. Creativity
- 4. People management
- Coordinating with others
- 6. Emotional intelligence
- 7. Judgement and decision making
- 8. Service orientation
- 9. Negotiation
- 10. Cognitive flexibility

Foundation for Future Economy

In a climate of technological and political flux, decisionmakers realise the urgent requirement to grow Northern Ireland's skills base to make our young workforce more valuable to employers and investors - to be prepared and ready for success.

The DEL Skills Barometer and CBI employer research confirms that all school leavers need to have employability skills and be commercially aware, not just those who study business. Because these competencies are the foundation of our future economy, the NI Executive has realised the value of enterprise education in both its draft Industrial Strategy and draft Programme for Government.

Investment in skills has a long-term impact. Given the clear need to rebalance our economy and create a more entrepreneurial culture, this now needs to become a priority at government level. We are reaching more young people than ever to nurture the ambition and capability in next generations to become business owners and leaders.

'Change won't wait for us: business leaders, educators and governments all need to be proactive in up-skilling and retraining people so everyone can benefit from the Fourth Industrial Revolution'.
